



Dr. Rich Fischer is a Research Wildlife Biologist in the Ecological Resources Branch, Environmental Laboratory, U.S. Army Engineer Research and Development Center. He has served as President of the National Military Fish and Wildlife Association and currently is the EL Wildlife Team Leader, Program Coordinator for the Department of Defense Bird Conservation Program, and Lead for the ERDC Threatened and Endangered Species Team. He is a Certified Wildlife Biologist with *The Wildlife Society*.

Rich's expertise and research interests include avian ecology and management on Department of Defense lands; riparian zone ecology, restoration and management on military installations and civil works projects; and development of modeling and management approaches for threatened and endangered species.

He has authored or coauthored more than 80 peer-reviewed, conference and in-house papers; presented more than 70 papers at national and international conferences; and trained over 2,000 Federal and non-Federal natural resource managers as lead instructor in >50 national and international training courses. Rich received his doctorate in Forestry, Wildlife and Range Sciences from University of Idaho in 1994. His dissertation research addressed the influence of fire on the ecology of a migratory sage grouse population in southern Idaho. He enjoys international travel and birding. Rich and his wife Tami reside in Louisville, KY with their 8 children.
